### **Claudia Cooper**

Professor of Psychological Medicine and Centre Lead & Honorary Consultant Psychiatrist Centre of Psychiatry and Mental Health, Queen Mary University of London & East London NHS Foundation Trust

Professor Claudia Cooper is lead for the Centre for Psychiatry and mental Health, within the Wolfson Institute of Population Health at QMUL; and honorary Consultant old age psychiatrist at ELFT Tower Hamlets memory service. She leads the Alzheimer's Society Centre of Excellence for Independence at home; and the NIHR/ESRC APPLE-Tree programme, investigating how lifestyle and behavioural change can prevent dementia. She is a member of the UK Cabinet Office Trial Advice Panel.



### **Steve Gillard**

Professor of Mental Health Research School of Health Sciences, City, University of London

Professor Gillard is a mental health services researcher whose research takes a social and community perspective on mental health. He leads an internationally recognised programme of NIHR-funded research on peer support in mental health services, currently exploring adaptation of peer support into different specialist mental health settings and cultural contexts, and online peer support. His research takes a critical approach to the coproduction of knowledge, supporting and enabling researchers working from an explicitly experiential and survivor perspective to shape and change the way mental health research is done. Having begun as a qualitative researcher, his research brings randomised controlled trials and quasi-experimental methods together with experiential knowledge to provoke and produce new insight.

#### **Charlotte Kenton**

EMBED-Care Programme Manager Marie Curie Palliative Care Research Department, University College London

Charlotte is the Programme Manager for Empowering Better End of Life Dementia Care (EMBED-Care) at UCL. Prior to this, Charlotte worked on a range of palliative care and end of life research studies including looking at ways to increase consent to organ donation in ICUs, young adults experiences of dying from cancer and children with long-term conditions and their inpatient hospital experiences. EMBED-Care is led by Prof Liz Sampson.



### **Philip McNamee**

TACK Programme Manager Unit for Social and Community Psychiatry, Queen Mary University of London

Philip is a senior researcher based at the Unit for Social and Community Psychiatry. His research work currently focuses on DIALOG+, a resource-oriented intervention used to structure routine healthcare meetings. As part of this he is the co-Chief Investigator of the Remote DIALOG+ study, which aims to develop a new software platform to allow for the remote delivery of DIALOG+ in community care for people with psychosis, and the programme manager of the TACK study which is investigating DIALOG+ for people with chronic depression in a large multicentre trial. He also works with teams and Trusts across the UK and globally to implement DIALOG+ in a variety of services and settings.



### **Rachel Morse**

Research Assistant

Mental Health Neuroscience, Division of Psychiatry, University College London

Rachel works on the APPLE-Tree study investigating a lifestyle-based, wellbeing intervention aiming to reduce cognitive decline in older adults with mild cognitive impairment or subjective cognitive decline. Her main research interests are in lifestyle and patient-centred approaches to dementia care and prevention.

### Milena Nikolajeva

Research Assistant Youth Resilience Unit, Queen Mary University of London

Milena is currently working on the DEER study, which is a Barts Charity-funded longitudinal cohort study. The project seeks to understand emotional resilience in young children aged 7 to 10 in East London, and how they use personal, social, and community resources to overcome mental distress. Her research interests include addictive behaviours in children and adolescents, particularly the aetiology, lifelong impact, and associated comorbidities. She is also interested in exploring the links between neurodivergence and resilience in young people.



#### **Kirsten Prest**

HARP Doctoral Research Fellow School of Health & Psychological Sciences, City University of London

Kirsten is a paediatric occupational therapist with an interest in supporting parents and carers of children with disabilities across a variety of contexts both in the UK and South Africa. She recently completed a Masters in Evidence-Based Healthcare at the University of Oxford where she conducted a study exploring the impact of play-based groups for children with disabilities on maternal wellbeing. Her current doctoral research focuses on co-adapting the Baby Ubuntu programme for an ethnically diverse and disadvantaged urban London context. The Ubuntu model is a community-based participatory caregiver training intervention that has been developed and successfully tested in resource-limited settings such as Uganda, Ghana and Bangladesh, and has been implemented globally. Evaluation has demonstrated improvements in parental quality of life and self-efficacy. After co-adapting this intervention for a UK context, she aims to pilot test the acceptability and feasibility with two groups of families, to inform a larger-scale evaluation of the intervention in the UK.


