Mixing Two Injectable Medicines in the Same Syringe

Issue

A recent medicines incident reported that two psychotropic medicines were mixed in the same syringe and administered to a patient. These were midazolam and clopixol acuphase, which were prescribed as "stat" doses and to be given at the same time.

Learning Points

- In Mental Health care, different medicines must NOT be mixed in the same syringe.
- Injections must not be mixed in the same syringe because they may not be compatible.
- Incompatibility can involve precipitation, ionic reactions and denaturation of biological molecules.
- If two psychotropic medicines are to be given by injection at the same time, they must be drawn up in separate syringes and administered separately.

Exceptions: In Community Health Newham, mixing two injectable medicines may be common practice, for instance, when delivery is via a syringe driver.
