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"You can go home today" Doccla kits allow patients to complete their care in a virtual ward

Cambridgeshire Community Services NHS Foundation Trust (CCS), which is part of the Bedfordshire, Luton and Milton Keynes Health and Care Partnership (BLMK HCP) has commissioned Doccla - the virtual ward system kit - to support patients with chronic diseases.

The service was first used for respiratory patients in January 2021 and has now been extended to help patients living with Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), heart failure and diabetes. The Doccla kit allows patients to be discharged to continue their recovery in the comfort of their homes while being monitored safely and remotely by clinicians.







Everything's going tip top for the Grove View Integrated Health and Care Hub

Local dignitaries led by Central Bedfordshire Council's Vice-Chairman Cllr. Gordon Perham, Executive Members, NHS partners, stakeholders, and their guests with a head for heights gathered to commemorate the completion of the highest point of this state-of-the-art health care facility.

The building comprises multiple clinical and treatment rooms, office accommodation and a café, and will also offer 98 new one and two-bedroom affordable homes for the over 55s.

The work commenced in August 2021 with the aim that the new homes and the modern four-storey integrated health and care hub will be operational by Spring 2023.



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Mount Vernon Cancer Care update



A review of the Mount Vernon Cancer Centre provision began in May 2019 because of concerns about ageing buildings and the limited support facilities on site. For example, there are no high dependency or intensive care beds so patients who become very poorly are sent in an emergency ambulance to Watford General Hospital, or other nearby hospitals.

The relocation from the Mount Vernon Cancer Centre will be based on one of the following options for radiotherapy provision and will include the development of a networked radiotherapy site either at the Lister Hospital or the Luton and Dunstable Hospital. The options are:

- All radiotherapy to take place at the new Cancer Centre in Watford.
- Main radiotherapy service to be at the new Cancer Centre in Watford, with an additional networked unit at the Lister Hospital.
- Main radiotherapy service to be at the new Cancer Centre in Watford, with an additional networked unit at Luton and Dunstable Hospital.

Meanwhile the Mount Vernon Programme team are awaiting the outcome of a capital funding decision which will support the business case under the new hospitals programme.

The CCG Cancer Programme team are also reviewing patient access to services with NHS England and NHS Improvement/I. Monthly meetings are held with the Mount Vernon Programme team to progress our inequalities work such as access to transport and a review of the uptake of radiotherapy for our Bedfordshire and Luton residents who are the primary users of the service.



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With over 7,000 moderately and severely frail individuals over 65 in Luton, an online dashboard has been created by Cambridgeshire Community Services in partnership with local health and social care organisations, that allows for the sharing of patient data to enable clinicians to proactively identify frail older people vulnerable to hospital admissions.

The technological tool allows clinicians to quickly identify and prioritise the most atrisk patients in the community and gives the healthcare teams a head start to organise care plans, medication reviews and visits from health professionals.



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Humanitarian hub at Luton airport welcomes Ukrainian refugees

There's a beacon of support at the end of their flight for passengers fleeing from Ukrainian war zones.

The humanitarian hub was created by the Bedfordshire Local Resilience Forum which operates a collaborative approach with local authorities, NHS Clinical Commissioning Groups, emergency services, the charity and voluntary sector and the airport.

On arrival at the hub, passengers are greeted with kindness and practical assistance such as advice, information, useful contacts for local and national agencies, refreshments, guidance for onward travel within the UK and mental and physical health support.







Recordings of the BLMK Health and Care Conversations On...were interrupted while all efforts were concentrated on dealing with the recent Omicron wave of the Covid pandemic.
