

Learning from BCHS Medication Incidents


In December we saw 23 medication incidents reported for BCHS, 16 were external medication errors. A thematic review of the internal incidents have highlighted the following learning:

Incident

Glycopyrronium injection which was 4 days out of date was administered to a patient in error. No harm came to the patient in this incident The expired medication was removed from circulation and a new supply obtained.

Good Practice and Learning

All staff should familiarise themselves with the **10R's** of safe administration of medicine

Good Practice Interventions



Tracy Flanagan (Heart Failure Nurse) Intervened when a patient was prescribed ramipril (an ACE inhibitor) by their GP. It was identified that this was contraindicated as the patient was already on Sacubitril/Valsartan (Entresto). The BNF states that concomitant use with an ACE inhibitor is contraindicated due to risk of angioedema. The patient had took both medications for several days. Tracy sent an urgent task to GP to review the patient's bloods and prescribe an alternative. She telephoned the patient to withhold/stop the medication until review. Great work Tracy!

Clare Moody (lead pharmacy technician) Intervened when a patient was discharged without their usual ibuprofen and mirabegron. The patient was experiencing urinary symptoms and the GP was informed of the discrepancy for review.

Priti Patel (pharmacy technician) Intervened when a patient was sent home with clarithromycin Injection as well as both carbocisteine capsules and liquid without any information on the discharge letter. She clarified with the acute hospital that the patient was to continue with carbocisteine liquid and that the clarithromycin injection was to be discarded.

A big thank you to Priti for also providing extra support at short notice for the mental health teams in Luton over the Christmas period. Priti also had to cover increased BCHS caseloads due to staff training and annual leave during this period.
